11. **SUBJECT:** Mitchell Farms Development Application Update
DEPARTMENT: Community and Economic Development
DESCRIPTION: The City received an application for a General Plan Amendment, Rezone, Tentative Subdivision Map, Design Review Permit, and Tree Permit for the development known as Mitchell Farms on the Sunrise Golf Course site (7925 Arcadia Drive). Staff will provide an update regarding the application.

Planning Manager McDuffee provided a status report on the Mitchell Farms Development. In November 2016 the City received an application for the development. The Applicant has met with

the City and other agencies to discuss comments on the proposed project. It is anticipated that the project will be heard by the Planning Commission and City Council in February/March 2018.

CITY MANAGER ITEMS

City Manager Boyd commended staff for their efforts to maintain the public-right-of-way and storm drains during the recent storm event. He stated in 2010 the City implemented a Storm Drain Capital Improvement Program which has installed over 12,000lf of storm drain pipe. Also in 2010 the City began an annual storm drain pipe cleaning program cleaning approximately 250,000lf of storm drain pipe each year. General Services also cleans and maintains 26 miles of creeks that run through the City.

Summary and Recommendation

On August 11, 2016, City Council awarded a contract to Central Valley Engineering & Asphalt in the amount of \$912,992.56 for the 2016 Residential Street Resurfacing Project (Project). The contractor has completed all construction work and all required payroll compliance documentation and the Project has been field accepted by staff.

Staff recommends City Council approve the attached resolution, accepting the Project as complete, directing the Project Engineer to record a Notice of Completion for the Project, and authorizing the City Manager to release the remaining retention amount after the 35 day lien period.

Fiscal Impact

The Contractor was awarded a contract in the amount of \$912,992.56 for the Base Bid. During the progress of the work, four (4) change orders were issued, which resulted in a net increase in the contract of \$69,104.62. The final project cost is \$982,097.18, which is 7.6% more than the original bid. Funding for construction, construction management and inspection came from the following sources: Gas Tax, Measure A Maintenance, and Storm Water Utility funds.

Background and Analysis

Streets are selected for resurfacing on a priority basis using the City's computerized Pavement Management System and an on-site inspection by staff. The program coordinates and prioritizes various elements of pavement maintenance and types of resurfacing based on various factors including surface and structural condition, traffic volume, costs, and historical repairs. The streets in this project were selected to be resurfaced because of the level of deterioration in the pavement.

Subject: 2016 Residential Street Resurfacing Project – Final Acceptance

Date: February 9, 2017

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This year's project accomplished pavement repairs and asphalt concrete overlays on five (5) streets with an approximate total length of 1.3 miles.

On August 11, 2016, the City Council awarded a contract to Central Valley Engineering & Asphalt for the Project and a Notice to Proceed was issued effective August 29, 2016. Work on the project was completed and field accepted in December 2016. Staff and the Contractor have agreed on the final pay quantities and now seek final acceptance by the City Council.

Conclusion

Staff recommends City Council approve the attached resolution, accepting the Project as complete, directing the Project Engineer to record a Notice of Completion for the Project, and authorizing the City Manager to release the remaining retention amount after the 35 day lien period.

Central Valley Engineering & Asphalt has provided the required 100% Warranty Bond to guarantee their work for one year.

Summary and Recommendation

On March 26, 2015, the Citrus Heights City Council awarded a construction contract to Martin Brothers Construction (Martin Brothers) for the Sunrise Boulevard Complete Streets Improvements Project – Phase 3 (the Project). Martin Brothers has satisfied all the work detailed in the contract documents and the Project is now complete.

Staff recommends City Council approve the attached resolution, accepting the Project as complete, directing the Project Engineer to record a Notice of Completion for the Project, and authorizing the City Manager to release the remaining retention amount after the 35 day lien period.

Fiscal Impact

The original contract amount, based on estimated quantities, was \$4,149,112.67. During progress of the work, changes in field conditions and additional work items resulted in execution of Four (4) Change Orders. These change orders decreased the final adjusted contract price to \$4,141,894.61, which represents a 0.17 % decrease from the original contract amount.

The 2015-2019 Capital Improvement Program designated the following funding sources for construction, inspection and materials testing associated with this Project: Congestion Mitigation & Air Quality (CMAQ) and Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP) Grant Funds, City's Transportation Development Act (Bike & Pedestrian), Measure A Capital, Measure A Maintenance, Gas Tax, Stormwater Utility and General Capital funds.

Background and Analysis

Sunrise Boulevard is a high volume high speed arterial, with approximately 39,000 vehicles per day and the 85th percentile speed at 45mph. Sunrise Boulevard serves as a primary vehicle, bicycle and pedestrian access for the residential communities east and west of Sunrise as well as a

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direct link north to Placer County and the City of Roseville. However, there was no continuous sidewalk, bike lane or standard street lighting along Sunrise Boulevard between Antelope Road and the Placer County Line north of Twin Oaks Avenue.

The City's goal for this Project was to continue to improve the safety, functionality and aesthetic improvements as those constructed with the Sunrise Boulevard Complete Streets Improvement Phase 1 Project, completed in 2013. The Project replaced existing curb, gutter and sidewalk with new vertical curb and wider, ADA compliant sidewalks and constructed infill curb, gutter and sidewalk where sections are missing (along the west side of Sunrise Blvd. only). The full width of the roadway received minor pavement repairs and an asphalt overlay and it was re-stripped to provide two (2) travel lanes in each direction with a center two-way left-turn lane (between existing landscaped median segments) and wider bike lanes. The existing signalized intersection at Twin Oaks Avenue was upgraded with new state-of-the-art control equipment, countdown pedestrian signal heads, new ADA curb ramps, decorative stamped crosswalks, bicycle detection and traffic cameras. Fully accessible transit stops with shelters were also constructed.

On March 26, 2015, the City Council awarded a construction contract to Martin Brothers Construction for the Project. All punch list related work is now complete and the project is ready for final acceptance.

Conclusion

Staff recommends the City Council approve the attached Resolution, accepting the Sunrise Boulevard Complete Streets Improvements Project – Phase 3 as complete, authorizing the Project Engineer to record a Notice of Completion with the Sacramento County Recorder and further authorizing the City Manager to release retention funds withheld after the 35 day lien period.

SUBJECT: **Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC) Frontline Law Enforcement Funding**

Summary and Recommendation

The State of California allocated \$20 million for frontline law enforcement to increase positive outcomes between police and high-risk populations (e.g., homeless, the mentally ill, and at-risk youth). Of this funding, Sacramento County city police agencies were allocated \$568,225 with the City of Citrus Heights Police Department (CHPD) designated as the fiduciary agent responsible for distributing the allocations.

Staff recommends City Council approve resolution 2017- _____ accepting the allocation of frontline law enforcement funding, with the Citrus Heights Police Department acting as the fiduciary agent.

Fiscal Impact

There is no fiscal impact and no matching requirements for this funding allocation. There is also no fiscal impact on the city for CHPD acting as the fiduciary agent of the allocated funding. CHPD's portion of this funding, along with previous years' funding, will cover the costs of the additional police officer position approved by Council in Resolution No. 2013-035 dated April 11, 2013 through January of 2018.

Background and Analysis

In recognizing the need for increased funding for local police agencies, the State of California proposed the 2012 Budget Act in which \$24 million was appropriated for City Police Department grants under The Schools and Local Public Safety Protection Act of 2012 (Proposition 30). In response to the passing of Proposition 30, the Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC), in consultation with the Department of Finance, developed a formula for the allocation of funds for each county.

BSCC Frontline Law Enforcement Funding

February 9, 2017

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To further enhance the significant work being done with this funding, the Budget Act of 2013 increased the appropriation by \$3.5 million raising the allocation to \$27.5 million. Recognizing the importance of funding, the California Police Chiefs Association (CPCA) lobbied the state for additional funds to further enhance the services provided by local law enforcement agencies. CPCA was successful in their efforts; for fiscal year 2014-2015 the state appropriated \$40 million to local law enforcement agencies. However, for fiscal year 2015-2016 the state cut this funding in half, from \$40 million to \$20 million.

The allocation for this fiscal year is again \$20 million; however, this is the last year city police departments will receive this funding. In addition, this funding from BSCC requires that nearly 60 percent of the funding provided to each county be directed to agencies with fewer than 100 sworn police officers; which in Sacramento County represents the cities of Citrus Heights, Folsom, and Galt. As well, the BSCC has amended the spending and reporting requirements for this funding as set forth below:

Spending: Funding may be used to supplement, not supplant, for homeless outreach teams, Crisis Intervention Training for officers, Gang Resistance Education and Training (GREAT), resources for drug endangered children, outreach to high-risk youth, youth diversion programs, and gang and violence prevention programs.

Reporting: Each agency receiving this funding will have to provide, to the BSCC, the number of new teams established, or planned to be established; the type of training and the number of peace officers trained, or planned to be trained; and the type of equipment or resources that were purchased, or planned to be purchased.

All participating agencies within Sacramento County have agreed to provide this data.

The funding awards were determined on an approved formula-based allocation with one city in each county identified as the fiduciary agent for the funding. Citrus Heights has the responsibility of allocating the funds as determined via a collective decision made by local police chiefs. Based upon this formula, \$568,225 was awarded to city police agencies within Sacramento County and CHPD is the fiduciary agent.

Accordingly, the Sacramento County Police Chiefs collectively determined that the Sacramento County funding is to be disbursed as follows:

- Sacramento Police Department \$ 168,138
- Elk Grove Police Department \$ 85,000
- Citrus Heights Police Department \$ 105,029
- Galt Police Department \$ 105,029
- Folsom Police Department \$ 105,029

Conclusion

The Police Department is requesting City Council approve the resolution accepting the \$568,225 in grant funding (in which CHPD will receive \$105,029) and naming CHPD as the fiduciary agent to distribute said funds to our local law enforcement agency partners.

Summary and Recommendation

The Municipal Code currently provides that no individual may serve more than eight years on the Planning Commission or History and Arts Commission (collectively, the “Commissions”). This ordinance would amend the Municipal Code to provide that no individual may serve more than eight consecutive years on a particular Commission, but may serve on that Commission again after two years have passed.

Fiscal Impact

None

Background and Analysis

The City Council previously created a Planning Commission and a History and Arts Commission, each of which consists of seven members. Each Council Member appoints a member to each Commission to serve a four year term, subject to ratification by the City Council. Additionally, the City Council, by a majority vote, appoints two at-large members to each Commission to serve two-year terms. Section 2-271 of the Citrus Heights Municipal Code currently provides that no member of the Planning Commission shall serve more than eight years. Section 2-264 of the Citrus Heights Municipal Code similarly provides that no member of the History and Arts Commission shall serve more than eight years. This ensures turnover in the membership of the Commissions so that more members of the public may have an opportunity to serve.

The proposed ordinance clarifies that no member of a particular Commission may serve more than eight consecutive years on that Commission, but allows an individual who has served eight consecutive years on a particular Commission to serve on that Commission again after two years have passed. This allows the City Council to appoint individuals to the Planning Commission and History and Arts Commission with valuable past experience, while still ensuring members of the community have an opportunity to serve on the Commissions. Additionally, the proposed ordinance exempts partial terms from the calculation of consecutive years served on a Commission. A partial term for regular members of a Commission is a term lasting less than two years. A partial term for at-large

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members of a Commission is a term lasting less than one year. The proposed ordinance would also formally codify that at-large members of the History and Arts Commission serve two-year terms.

Conclusion

Staff recommends the City Council introduce, read by title only, and waive the first full reading of Ordinance 2017-_____, an ordinance amending the Municipal Code regarding the terms of members of the History and Arts Commission and Planning Commission.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the City Council has previously established a planning commission and a history and arts commission, each of which consist of seven members (collectively, the “Commissions”); and

WHEREAS, Section 2-264 of the Citrus Heights Municipal Code currently provides that no member of the History and Arts Commission shall serve more than eight years, which ensures turnover in the membership of the History and Arts Commission so that more members of the public may serve; and

WHEREAS, Section 2-271 of the Citrus Heights Municipal Code currently provides that no member of the Planning Commission shall serve more than eight years, which ensures turnover in the membership of the Planning Commission so that more members of the public may serve; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to clarify that no individual may serve more than eight consecutive years on a particular Commission, but that an individual who has previously served eight consecutive years on a particular Commission may serve again on that Commission after two years have passed; and

WHEREAS, allowing individuals who have previously served eight years on a particular Commission to serve on that Commission again enables the City Council to appoint individuals with valuable past experience, but while still ensuring opportunities in the membership of the Commissions; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to exempt partial terms from the calculation of consecutive years of service on a Commission; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to formally codify that at-large members of the history and arts commission shall serve two-year terms.

NOW THEREFORE, the City of Citrus Heights does ordain as follows:

Section 1. Recitals Made Findings

The above recitals are hereby declared to be true and correct and findings of the City Council of the City of Citrus Heights.

Section 2. Amendment to Municipal Code

Section 2-271 of the Citrus Heights Municipal Code is amended to read as follows (with text in ~~strikeout~~ format indicating deletion and underlined text indicating addition):

Sec. 2-271. - Terms of members.

- (a) Regular and at-large members of the planning commission shall serve at the pleasure of the city council. Subject to the preceding, the term of office of each regular member of the planning commission shall be the same as the term of office of the councilmember who nominated the member, and the term of office of each at-large member shall be until the January next following the city's biennial regular municipal election. If a councilmember leaves office prior to the normal expiration of his or her term, the regular member nominated by the departing councilmember shall remain in office until replaced by the successor councilmember's nomination or until otherwise removed by the city council.
- (b) No regular or at-large member shall serve more than eight consecutive years on the planning commission. An individual who has previously served eight consecutive years on the planning commission is eligible for reappointment to the planning commission after two years have passed. Each member, unless sooner terminated, shall serve until his or her successor is appointed and qualified.
- (c) Partial terms shall not be counted for the purpose of determining if a member has served eight consecutive years on the planning commission. A partial term for a regular member is a term lasting less than two years. A partial term for an at-large member is a term lasting less than one year.

Section 3. Amendment to Municipal Code

Section 2-264 of the Citrus Heights Municipal Code is amended to read as follows (with text in ~~strikeout~~ format indicating deletion and underlined text indicating addition):

Sec. 2-264. - Terms of members.

- (a) Members of the history and arts commission shall serve at the pleasure of the city council. Subject to the preceding, the term of office of each regular member of the commission shall be the same as the term of office of the councilmember who nominated the member, and the term of office of each at-large member shall be until the January next following the city's biennial regular municipal election. If a councilmember leaves office prior to the normal expiration of his or her term, the regular member nominated by the departing councilmember shall remain in office until replaced by the successor councilmember's nomination and city council ratification or until otherwise removed by the city council.
- (b) No member shall serve more than eight consecutive years on the history and arts commission. An individual who has previously served eight consecutive years on the history and arts commission is eligible for reappointment to the history and arts commission after two years have passed. Each member, unless sooner terminated, shall serve until his or her successor is appointed and qualified.

(c) Partial terms shall not be counted for the purpose of determining if a member has served eight consecutive years on the history and arts commission. A partial term for a regular member is a term lasting less than two years. A partial term for an at-large member is a term lasting less than one year.

Section 4. Severability

If any section of this Ordinance is determined to be unenforceable, invalid, or unlawful, such determination shall not affect the enforceability of the remaining provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 5. Effective Date and Publication

This Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its adoption, and within fifteen (15) days after its passage, shall be posted in three public places.
