From the desk of the Chief



Frequently I am asked what I think about the current climate of unrest and tension that exists between law enforcement and citizens as has been played out on national television in recent months. It is my belief that the answer has a great deal to do with trust. From day one as Chief of Police for the city of Citrus Heights, my priority has been building and maintaining a solid relationship with the community, the foundation of which is confidence and trust. Utilizing a community oriented policing model, we diligently and consistently work on this every single day – it is first and foremost in all we do. Moreover, having achieved a close partnership with our citizens, we do not for a minute take it for granted. We have to earn it every day, every hour, every call for service. We can only succeed when our community is comfortable working alongside us that is, working together. Conversely, a lack of trust leads very quickly to weakened partnerships, less effective service, and a lower safety threshold for everyone – officers and citizens alike. I would argue that where there has been unrest around the country related to police incidents, there likely was already a lack of community trust in their police. Some of the ways we have worked to build trust and confidence with the Citrus Heights community include but are not limited to:

- reducing crime
- rapid response to calls for service
- highly trained officers responding to calls for service
- follow-up and accountability
- officers personally knowing our community: individuals, neighborhoods, businesses
- building relationships with our youth and developing trust early
- dealing with community problems promptly and effectively
- excellent communication and outreach with our residents and businesses via social media, our website, newsletters, email blasts, neighborhood meetings, members of service clubs, etc.
- holding traffic offenders accountable
- always being aware of, and paying attention to, community input. LISTEN and implement improvement whenever possible, wherever we can.

As always, we invite you to share with us your ideas, concerns, or suggestions - anytime. Additionally, there are many ways in which adults, teens, and children can become better acquainted with the department: volunteering, youth groups, ride-alongs (patrol), sit-alongs (dispatch), Citizen's Academy, Explorers, various programs, and much more. Family Disaster Plan



Oftentimes when there has been an upsurge of disturbing news stories, we are flooded here at the police department with calls about how citizens can prepare themselves and their families for emergencies. What we tell them is the best choice that they can make for their families is to be prepared, and have a plan in advance that they have discussed and practiced.

Having a Family Disaster Plan does not have to be complicated. There are some easy to fill out templates available on the American Red Cross website and other reputable government sources. One of the things that we recommend is to have an "Emergency Binder" put together prior to any emergency.

This binder should include the names, birthdates, and contact information for all of your family members. The next page should be your emergency contacts, and any medications that are required by your family. Then discuss with your family where your meeting place would be in case there was a major emergency and all of you were away from home, and cell services were down. It can be a relative's house the next town over, or a public area such as your local church or school.

Discuss with your children what the most likely disasters could affect your household, be it fire, earthquake, or flood. Talk about escape routes to take from your home to your designated safe meeting place. If your family is separated during the emergency, where will the meeting place be for you?

Talking to children about disasters or emergencies does not have to be something that frightens them. You can make practicing evacuating your home an age appropriate game, seeing who can get to the meeting place first, et cetera.

There are several emergency food kits available for purchase at major retailers, and plenty of websites that show how to assemble one. Don't overlook the need to store enough water. Per FEMA, a good rule of thumb is:

- One gallon of water per person per day, for drinking and sanitation.
- Children, nursing mothers and sick people may need more water.
- A medical emergency might require additional water.
- If you live in a warm weather climate more water may be necessary. In very hot temperatures, water needs can double.

Keep at least a three-day supply of water per person.

In the age of technology, many of us have gotten away from memorizing phone numbers and addresses for loved ones. You may consider having those numbers written on a list inside your vehicles glove box in case your cell phones are no longer operable.

Share your completed plan with those who need to know it. This could include extended family or friends. Check in with your family every 6 months or so to review or update your plan as needed. Assure your family that the more prepared they are for the unknown, the less power the unknown has.

Creek Protection Work Underway in Stock Ranch Nature Preserve



The Sacramento Area Sewer District (SASD) has begun construction on the second phase of the Creek Protection Project. The Project will upgrade sewer pipelines crossing local creeks in order to minimize the risk of sewer overflows into waterways.

Phase II work includes five sites, two of which are in Citrus Heights along Arcade Creek in the Stock Ranch Nature Preserve. Over the next few months, work will occur along the creek east of the Preserve's pedestrian bridge.

For public and worker safety, access on unpaved trails near work areas will be restricted. SASD is asking Preserve visitors to please obey all signage, avoid fenced areas, and use alternate hiking routes to stay clear of the work zones.

Sewer service to homes and businesses will not be interrupted during construction. Some dust and noise might be experienced near the work sites, but crews will work to minimize impacts to people, plants, and wildlife.

Republic Services Offers "Hands Free" Service

Along with some of the lowest rates for trash and recycling services, Republic Services is proud to offer several free amenities and specialty programs specifically designed for the elderly and disabled residential customers of Citrus Heights as well as for individuals who regularly utilize household sharps.

On Premises service is a convenience provided by Republic for elderly individuals over the age of seventy-five (75) and live alone or for disabled individuals who cannot move the trash, recycle, and green waste carts under their own physical power. During your regularly scheduled collection day, your Republic Services driver will pull your carts out of your enclosure or storage location, service them, and place them back in their original position. To sign up for this "hands free" service, you must be a Citrus Heights resident that currently is paying for residential trash and recycling through Republic and can prove that you are either over the age of seventy-five (75) and do not have a younger individual living in the household that could haul the bins curbside, via driver's license, birth certificate, etc., or have a mental or physical disability as diagnosed by a licensed physician that would limit you from hauling the bins curbside by yourself. If you or somebody you know meets these qualifications and could benefit from this service, please call Republic Services at (916) 725-9060 or (916) 638-9000 and schedule your On Premises cart service today.

Along with free collection of household batteries, motor oil, and oil filters, Republic Services also offers residential customers free front door collection of home generated hypodermic needles, syringes, and lancets. To be eligible for pickup, each resident must first call Republic Services prior to their service day at (916) 725-9060 or (916) 638-9000 to schedule an appointment. After receiving confirmation of the appointment from the Republic Services Customer Service Department, place all needles, lancets, and syringes in an approved sharps container that is completely closed and locked, then set the sharps container on your doorstep for collection. Approved sharps containers are widely available at local drug stores, pharmacies, and at Republic Services' Elder Creek Transfer Station (8642 Elder Creek Road). REMEMBER, sharps will not be collected if they are not in an approved sharps collection container that is completely closed and locked.



Project	Description	Status
Parkoaks Creek Bank Restoration Project - Brooktree Creek	Improvements to the creek bank at Parkoaks Drive and Brooktree Creek to prevent further creek bank erosion.	Construction expected to commence in August 2015
2015 Residential Street Resurfacing Program	Resurfacing of a limited number of neighborhood streets throughout the City.	Construction expected to begin in mid-July and be completed by October, weather permit- ting.
Sunrise Boulevard Complete Streets Project - Phase III	Pedestrian safety improvements along Sunrise from Antelope Road to Northern city Limits. Project will focus on the west side of Sunrise, and construct sidewalk, curb, and gutter; install access ramps and ADA upgrades and medians at the Twin Oaks intersection; modify the median on Sunrise north of Antelope; install street lights; resurface the entire roadway; and re-stripe traffic and bicycle lanes.	Under construction. Project expected to be completed in 6 – 7 months.
Sylvan Road Accessibility & Safety Improvements Project	Sidewalk improvements on east side of Sylvan Road just south of Bayside Church to connect to Sylvan Road/San Juan.	Construction to begin in July and be completed by November, weather permitting.
Twin Oaks Avenue / Mariposa Avenue Drainage Improvements Project	Add drainage pipes and improve drainage ditches along Mariposa and Twin Oaks Avenue to increase drainage capacity and reduce risk of flooding.	Construction expected to commence in June 2015.

Staff will be discussing deposits and long term nonprofit rental rates at the June 25th City Council Meeting during a study session. Staff anticipates any changes that are agreed upon will take effect January 1st, 2016.

The City's First-Time Homebuyer program provides low-interest loans of up to \$40,000 to low-income homebuyers that may be used for a down payment and closing costs.

Low-Interest Loans

The low-interest loan is structured as a second mortgage. The loan will have a rate of 3.00%, a term of 30 years with no required monthly payments. The total sum of the loan, with interest, will be due at the end of the 30-year term, upon sale or transfer of the property or if the borrower no longer occupies the home as their primary residence. The borrower must contribute a minimum of 1.00% of the purchase price. The actual amount of assistance is based on financial capacity.

Citrus Heights City Hall is Temporarily Relocating

Effective July 13, 2015, Citrus Heights City Hall will relocate to 7927 Auburn Boulevard in the Grand Oaks Shopping Center during construction of a new facility.

During the week of July 6-10, 2015, basic City Hall services will be provided at the Citrus Heights Community Center, located at 6300 Fountain Square Drive, during the transition of City staff to the temporary location.

In March 2015, the City Council approved construction of a new City Hall as part of the Medical Office Building and City Hall Project. The unique proposal to construct a Medical Office Building on the existing City Hall site and relocate City Hall to 6360 Fountain Square Drive is anticipated to result in a direct investment of \$53.2 million into the City's economy. Furthermore, the Medical Office Building will diversify the local economy, generate job opportunities, increase the City's Sales and User Utility Tax revenues, and stimulate approximately \$1.6 million in economic output.

Development of the Medical Office Building and new City Hall is slated to begin summer 2015. The Medical Office Building construction is estimated to last 18 months. Construction of the new City Hall facility is expected to be complete in late summer 2016.
