From the desk of the Chief

The Citrus Heights Police Department's Police Explorer Program is for young men and women between the ages of 14 and 20 who have an interest in law enforcement.

The intent of the Police Explorer Program is to educate and involve youth in police operations, interest them in law enforcement careers, enhance community outreach efforts, and raise awareness of law enforcement's role in society. Participation provides Explorers an understanding of the function of law enforcement as well as basic knowledge of the law enforcement profession. Members receive instruction in all phases of law enforcement including criminal law, traffic law, criminal investigation, crime prevention, traffic control, accident investigation, juvenile delinquency, and other related fields - each an integral part of the law enforcement industry.

CHPD's Police Explorer program affords participants direct contact with officers and other police department personnel in both group activities and one-on-one, personal interaction via meetings, special details, social functions, public service, and the Ride-Along Program (to name a few). Explorers develop physical and emotional strength, sound character, solid values, and a sense of purpose. In turn, Explorers utilize those qualities to positively impact their families, peers, and community. Explorers are members of the greater CHPD family and as such are afforded the corresponding respect and responsibility that designation carries.

Whether or not they choose law enforcement as a career, the traits, skills, and experience an Explorer acquires through the program have, in many cases, contributed to their success in other areas of their lives. Having graduated from CHPD's Explorer Program definitely gives these young adults an edge when applying to their chosen universities, Officer Candidate School (OCS), United States military, or for a position within the law enforcement industry. By their own admission, graduates from the program credit the confidence, discipline, and poise developed as a CHPD Explorer for many of their subsequent accomplishments. CHPD is very proud of all the exceptional young men and women who currently are, or at one time were, a CHPD Explorer.

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Animal Services

Live in harmony with local urban and suburban wildlife!

Citrus Heights residents can reduce many wildlife conflicts with these easy tips:

- 1. Maintain shrubbery at 6" or higher from the ground.
- 2. Install motion activated sprinklers to startle trespassing wildlife.
- 3. Secure home foundation and attic vents.
- 4. Enclose the underside of decks, patios and sheds to prevent entry.
- 5. Install dog & cat doors that can be latched at night.
- 6. Eliminate hiding spots like woodpiles, stacked yard debris, etc.
- 7. Inspect fences and gates for holes or weak spots. Make repairs to prevent easy yard access.
- 8. Feed pets indoors or remove outdoor food and water dishes at dusk.
- 9. Repair leaky water fixtures that could attract thirsty wildlife.
- 10. Avoid giving wildlife a free meal:
 - a. secure garbage can lids
 - b. remove fallen tree fruit and clear overripe or rotted vegetables from gardens
 - c. cover compost piles
 - d. use squirrel proof bird feeders and clean up ground scatter

Rollingwood Sewer Relief Project

SACRAMENTO AREA SEWER DISTRICT

Project description:

Crews will perform open-cut trenching along Rollingwood Boulevard, Sweetwood Court, and Butternut Drive, as well as tunneling under I-80, to install and connect new sewer pipelines. A portion of Butternut Drive will be closed to through-traffic for a 2½-month period of construction. During that time, all through-traffic will be detoured onto Lichen Drive. The project will increase sewer capacity for existing customers and improve system reliability.

Parkoaks Creek Bank Restoration Project - Brooktree Creek	Improvements to the creek bank at Parkoaks Drive and Brooktree Creek to prevent further creekbank erosion.	Construction expected to commence in August.
2015 Residential Street Resurfacing Program	Resurfacing portions of 23 residential streets throughout the City.	Construction expected to begin in July and take approximately 3 months to complete.
Sunrise Boulevard Complete Streets Project - Phase 3A	Pedestrian safety improvements along Sunrise from Antelope Road to Northern city Limits. Project will focus on the west side of Sunrise, and construct sidewalk, curb, and gutter; install access ramps and ADA upgrades and medians at the Twin Oaks intersection; modify the median on Sunrise north of Antelope; install street lights; resurface the entire roadway; and restripe traffic and bicycle lanes.	Utility relocation work is nearing completion. Full construction will begin in early August. Completion expected in December, weather permitting.
Twin Oaks Avenue / Mariposa Avenue Drainage Improvements Project	Add drainage pipes and improve drainage ditches along Mariposa and Twin Oaks Avenue to increase drainage capacity and reduce risk of flooding.	
Mariposa - Glenn Avenue Slope Failure Rehabilitation Project	Cripple Creek has eroded the bank on Mariposa near Glenn and the shoulder on Mariposa is failing. This project will restore the shoulder and construct a retaining wall to prevent future failures.	Construction expected to begin winter, weather permitting; otherwise in the spring of 2016
Sylvan Road Accessibility and Safety Improvements Project	Pedestrian safety improvement, with sidewalk installation on east side of Sylvan Road from just south of Bayside Church to San Juan Road. Additional intersection improvements at Stock Ranch Road and Sylvan Road.	Construction started in July and is expected to be complete in November/December.
New City Hall and Medical Office Build- ing (MOB) Project - Fountain Square Drive	Please see the New City Hall/MOB Project website	While the two projects are under construction, traffic on Fountain Square Drive, Stock Ranch Road, and Sylvan Road will be impacted – sometimes heavily – during the hours of 6:00 AM and 5:00 PM, Monday through Friday.



Citrus Heights First-Time Homebuyer Program

Need Help Purchasing a Home? THE CITY CAN HELP!

The City's First-Time Homebuyer program provides low-interest loans of up to \$40,000 to low-income homebuyers that may be used for a down payment and closing costs.

Low-Interest Loans

The low-interest loan is structured as a second mortgage. The loan will have a rate of 3.00%, a term of 30 years with no required monthly payments. The total sum of the loan, with interest, will be due at the end of the 30-year term, upon sale or transfer of the property or if the borrower no longer occupies the home as their primary residence. The borrower must contribute a minimum of 1.00% of the purchase price. The actual amount of assistance is based on financial capacity.

Declared a California Point of Historical Interest in 1991 and originally part of a 480 acre ranch, the **Rusch Home** was owned by Frederick and Julia Volle. The 1915 Craftsman home currently on the grounds replaced the original Volle home destroyed in a fire in 1914. Brother and Sister Fred and Julia Rusch, direct descendants of Louisa Volle and Herman Rusch, ran a small dairy farm and grew wheat and almonds on their land. In 1951, Fred and Julia donated 15 acres of their land which eventually became Rusch Park in the Sunrise Recreation and Park District and in 1977, the Sunrise Recreation & Park District added the Rusch Home & Gardens to Rusch Park.

MEDICAL OFFICE BUILDING AND CITY HALL PROJECT UPDATE

City Hall Relocation – On July 13, Citrus Heights City Hall temporarily relocated to 7927 Auburn Boulevard in the Grand Oaks Shopping Center. City Hall will operate out of the temporary location for 12 to 14 months during the construction of a new facility. The Police Department (6315 Fountain Square Drive) and Community Center (6300 Fountain Square Drive) will remain in their current locations.

New City Hall Groundbreaking Ceremony -

On July 15, the City, Capital Partners Development Company, local dignitaries, and community members celebrated the groundbreaking of a new City Hall and Utility Yard at 6360 Fountain Square Drive. The Medical Office Building and City Hall Project is a unique public-private-partnership resulting in a direct investment of \$53.2 million into the Citrus Heights economy and generating more than 170 jobs.

The one-story, 35,000-square-foot City Hall and adjacent 4,000-square-foot Utility Yard will consolidate 65 employees once housed in four separate buildings into one energy-efficient facility. The state-of-the-art facility will feature a "one-stop" public counter providing community members convenient access to City services.

Overall, the new City Hall will reduce maintenance and operation costs while enhancing the City's ability to continue providing high-quality and economical services to the Citrus Heights community for years to come. Completion of the new City Hall is slated for late summer 2016.







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New City Hall Construction Update – In collaboration with Capital Partners Development Company, Ascent Builders began construction on the new City Hall and Utility Yard at 6360 Fountain Square Drive on July 20. In addition, crews commenced construction on the Sylvan Road Improvements Project on July 20. See the Projects Location Map for detail on the affected areas.

As a result of the two construction projects, traffic on Fountain Square Drive, Stock Ranch Road, and Sylvan Road will be impacted – sometimes heavily – during the hours of 6:00 AM and 5:00 PM, Monday through Friday.

At times, there will be lane closures on Fountain Square Drive, Stock Ranch Road, and Sylvan Road. At least one lane will remain open at all times to maintain access to through traffic except for northbound Fountain Square Drive. For the first 3 to 4 weeks of construction, northbound Fountain Square Drive will be closed during the hours of 6:00 AM and 5:00 PM between the Post Office and Stock Ranch Road traffic circle.
