# From the desk of the Chief

Exceeding our community's expectations and achieving a high level of satisfaction among residents and businesses has been at the center of the Citrus Heights Police Departments success for more than a decade. To reach such a high level of success found within CHPD today wasn't easy,



and it was not generated by accident or conjured up out of thin-air with a magic wand. It took vision, leadership, hard work, dedication, and a collective commitment to an idea that others outside the organization may have had difficulty believing could be achieved. Being the new Police Chief at CHPD for only a few months, I want to readily point out that none of this success has anything to do with me, and everything to do with my predecessor as well as devotion of the professionals in the department which I recently took command of on October 31, 2016, more than ten years after the Department first opened its' doors. But being the new Chief from outside the organization uniquely situates me in a position to conduct an unbiased assessment of the organization and a responsibility to move the Department forward to its' next chapters of success.

Much like professional athletes, our police professionals have dedicated themselves to a level of performance that far exceeds the average and sets a high standard in the policing profession. They are committed to performing their duties at a level of their very best, all the time, and they strive for nothing short of excellence.

# New Mayor and Vice Mayor Selected by City Council


At their regular meeting on December 8, 2016, the Citrus Heights City Council appointed Jeff Slowey as the Mayor and Steve Miller as the Vice Mayor for the next 12 months. Each year, the City Council selects one of its members to serve a one-year term as mayor and vice mayor. Jeff Slowey was appointed December 19, 2003 to complete the remaining term of late Mayor William "Bill" Hughes. He was elected to the City Council in November 2004, and re-elected November 2008, 2012 and 2016. Steve Miller was appointed December 13, 2005, to fill a vacancy on the City Council. He was elected to the City Council in November 2006 and re-elected November 2010 and 2014.

# Planning Division Update

The Planning Division coordinates the City's review of residential and commercial development projects. The Planning Division evaluates the project for compliance with the City's General Plan, Zoning Code, and other City Standards. Below is a selected list of projects currently under review:

- 7942 Arcadia Drive Plush Lounge. An application has been received to reformat an existing lounge into a nightclub.
- 7925 Arcadia Drive Mitchell Farms. An application has been received to develop a 39 acre parcel into a new development with a variety of housing types for a total of 261 units.
- 8501 Auburn Boulevard. Big Lots/Rebounderz. An application has been received to convert an empty building (formerly K-Mart) into two businesses, an indoor trampoline facility and a retail store.
- 7882 Lichen Drive Quick Quack Car Wash. An application has been received to construct a drive-thru car wash on a vacant parcel.
- 7534 Old Auburn Road Bearpaw Village. Review for the development of a 43-unit townhome project.
- 7056 Sunrise Blvd Arco Gas Station and Car Wash. Review of a Use Permit and Design Review Permit to allow the construction and operation of a new gas station with convenience store and car wash.
- 7601 Sunrise Boulevard Human Bean. Application has been received to construct a drive-thru coffee kiosk on a vacant parcel just north of Old Auburn Road and Sunrise Boulevard.
- 7512 Watson Way. Linmoore Fence Company is seeking to expand existing business onto adjoining vacant parcels.

Baird Way Drainage Im- provements	Installation of new drainage inlets and pipes to increase capacity and eliminate recurring nuisance ponding.	Construction expected to commence in February or March 2017.
Sunrise Boulevard Complete Streets Pro- ject - Phase III	Pedestrian safety improvements along Sunrise from Antelope Road to northern city limits. Project will focus on the west side of Sunrise, and construct sidewalk, curb, and gutter; install access ramps and ADA upgrades and medians at the Twin Oaks intersection; modify the median on Sunrise north of Antelope; install street lights; resurface the entire roadway; and re-stripe traffic and bicycle lanes.	The project field work is complete. Staff anticipates presenting the project to the City Council for final acceptance in January.
2016 Accessibility and Drainage (Various Streets)	Constructing/reconstructing accessible curb ramps, reconstructing failed sections of existing curb, gutter and sidewalk, reconstructing and relocating drainage inlets, removal and replacement of deteriorated storm drain pipe, restoring and/or relocating traffic striping, legends and markers. With Republic Services you get more than just curbside pickup of trash, recycling, and green waste!
Listed below are all the extra services and programs we offer all year long!

- Holiday Tree-Cycling—Set your tree curbside (next to your trash cart) on your regular trash collection day, starting the day after Christmas.
- Holiday Light Recycling—Bring old, broken, unused holiday lights to City Hall to recycle, starting the day after Christmas.
- \* Household Hazardous Waste Collection Events— Bring your hazardous items to one of three HHW collection events. This year these events take place on April 8, June 10, and October 14 from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. at Sunrise Mall (in the parking lot behind Macy's Women's store).
- Neighborhood Cleanups—Keep your eye out for a door tag letting you when your three free neighborhood cleanups are. On these pre-assigned days, you can get rid of up to 10 cubic yards of waste, including e-waste.
- Pickup of Home Generated Sharps—You can get rid of used needles and syringes by making an appointment for a Republic Services driver to pick these up at your door.
- Pickup of Household Batteries—Put your dry cell, alkaline, rechargeable, or lithium batteries in a clear, sealed quart sized baggie and place atop your recycling cart on collection day. No appointment necessary. Lithium batteries must be taped on each end.
- Pickup of Used Oil and Oil Filters—Recycle your used oil and/or used oil filters on recycle day, no
  appointment needed. Call or refer to your 2017 Customer Service Guide Calendar for more information.
- \* Composting Workshops—Join us on April 8, June 10, or October 14 at the farmers market outside of Sunrise Mall to learn about backyard composting and vermiculture composting. Citrus Heights residents who RSVP will receive a free backyard composting bin.
- Extra Leaf Collection—November-January, you can place extra leaves in 30-gallon plastic bags and place next to your green waste cart on collection day. You can put out 6 additional bags at a time. Each bag has a 35 pound limit.

# Citrus Heights First-Time Homebuyer Program

# Need Help Purchasing a Home? THE CITY CAN HELP!

The City's First-Time Homebuyer program provides low-interest loans of up to \$40,000 to low-income homebuyers that may be used for a down payment and closing costs.

#### Low-Interest Loans

The low-interest loan is structured as a second mortgage. The loan will have a rate of 3.00%, a term of 30 years with no required monthly payments. The total sum of the loan, with interest, will be due at the end of the 30-year term, upon sale or transfer of the property or if the borrower no longer occupies the home as their primary residence. The borrower must contribute a minimum of 1.00% of the purchase price. The actual amount of assistance is based on financial capacity.

# **Eligibility Requirements**

- The applicant <u>must not</u> have owned a home as a principal place of residence within the past (3) complete years.
- The property must be located within the city of Citrus Heights. The property may be a singlefamily dwelling or condominium unit. Multi-unit structures and mobilehomes are <u>not</u> eligible.
- The applicant must meet the low-income household requirements.
- Income Limits table in the column to the right.
   The current maximum income is calculated by applicant family size.

#### Get involved and make a positive impact in your neighborhood!


Whether you are new to Citrus Heights and still unpacking your moving boxes, or if you've lived here since cityhood was just a gleam in the eye of a few, we encourage you to check out your local Neighborhood Area (NA) group to see how those involved make such a difference in their respective communities. You can too!

Citrus Heights is divided into 11 neighborhoods, each of which is represented by its respective group of residents (see map). There are ten different neighborhood groups (areas 7 and 8 are combined) that meet once a month. These popular meetings, commonly referred to as NA Meetings, allow residents to address neighborhood issues (e.g. traffic or crime), work on various projects, host City staff for informational presentations, and much more. Interestingly, the public recently voted creation of the numbered neighborhoods one of Citrus Heights' Top 10 Accomplishments since incorporation in January 1997.

The NA's are an excellent opportunity to get to know your neighbors, work together to preserve the quality of life enjoyed in your neighborhood, and stay current on what is going on in the City: trends, events, information, alerts. There is no cost to join an NA and you do not have to own a home in order to belong. Anyone who lives, rents, or owns property or a business in Citrus Heights can get involved.

All of the NA's are part of REACH (Residents' Empowerment Association of Citrus Heights). REACH is a coalition that consists of a board of directors comprised of a representative from each neighborhood. REACH represents the interests of the community and its citizens, encouraging participation to preserve the quality of life in our city. REACH meets the 1st Monday of each month at 6:30 p.m. in the Community Room at City Hall (6360 Fountain Square
