

From the desk of the Chief



During my first 90 days as your police chief, I have focused primarily on learning the internal workings of our police department, reviewing our many policies and procedures, understanding our CHPD culture, assessing budget priorities, making minor adjustments to staff assignments, and asking a lot of questions. I have met just about everyone on our police staff, but still have a few to meet. I have discovered we have professionals at CHPD who care about this community and are committed to our noble policing profession. We are a busy police department and we maintain a working environment in which everyone contributes regularly. I have come to realize there is no "dead weight" at CHPD; everyone gives 100% all the time and no one individual takes the credit alone, but rather as a shared team. My assessment is that we are a high-volume, high-impact organization when it comes to protecting this community, driving down crime, and having a positive presence in our City. Our high level of performance seems to be a main reason many of our staff were attracted to work for such a professional organization.

My first 90-days have been very rewarding and I am proud to be your police chief. During the next 90-days I plan to begin a broader external outreach to meet more of our business community, Neighborhood Associations, community members, and schools. I recognize how critically important it is for a police chief to be accessible and connected with our community. You deserve to know who your police chief is and what I'm all about.

Last week I had the pleasure of meeting Louise "Weasie," Hansen-Cordray, the owner of Java Cherry Coffee House located at 6720 Van Maren Lane. I read about her unique coffee house in the Citrus Heights Sentinel and thought I would stop by to introduce myself (thank you to the Sentinel for such a great recommendation). Weasie made me a fantastic iced espresso and we had great conversation about Citrus Heights and her business, which has been open for about four years now. What a wonderful place. I also had an opportunity to eat lunch at a new restaurant, also recommended by the Sentinel: Taqueria Tres Hermanos on Greenback Lane. Unfortunately, the owners were too busy to chat, but it was great food!

I love meeting local business owners and shopping local to support our Citrus Heights businesses. It gives me an opportunity to hear about issues business owners are having that our City staff might be able to assist with. Approved by the City Council in fall 2016, the City officially purchased the new one-story, 35,000-square-foot City Hall building located at 6360 Fountain Square Drive!



The new facility currently houses approximately 65 employees (once located in four separate buildings) into a single energy-efficient City Hall. The state-of-the-art building features a “one-stop” public counter providing community members convenient access to City services. Purchasing the new facility will allow the City to continue to provide high-quality, efficient services to the community while managing operational and maintenance costs.

Construction Projects



Project	Description	Status
Baird Way Drainage Improvements	Installation of new drainage inlets and pipes to increase capacity and eliminate recurring nuisance ponding.	Construction expected to commence in February or March 2017.
Sunrise Boulevard Complete Streets Project - Phase III	Pedestrian safety improvements along Sunrise from Antelope Road to northern city limits. Project will focus on the west side of Sunrise and construct sidewalk, curb, and gutter; install access ramps and ADA upgrades and medians at the Twin Oaks intersection; modify the median on Sunrise north of Antelope; install street lights; re-surface the entire roadway; and re-stripe traffic and bicycle lanes.	The project field work is complete. Staff anticipates presenting the project to the City Council for final acceptance in February.
Storm Drain System Yearly Cleaning	Cleaning of the storm drain system to prevent street flooding.	Crews have completed cleaning of approximately 250,000 lf of storm drain pipe in Neighborhood Areas 1, 2, 3, and 4. This concludes the regular storm drain cleaning program for this year however the contractor remains available to assist clearing storm drains that get clogged during storm events.
2016 Residential Street Resurfacing (Various streets)	Annual street repaving project.	The contractor has completed the work. The project will be presented to City Council in February for Final Acceptance.

Planning Division Update

The Planning Division coordinates the City's review of residential and commercial development projects, evaluating each for compliance with the City's General Plan, Zoning Code, and other city standards.

Below is a selected list of projects currently under review:

7942 Arcadia Drive: Plush Lounge - An application has been received to reformat an existing lounge into a nightclub

7925 Arcadia Drive: Mitchell Farms - An application has been received to develop a 39-acre parcel into a new development with a variety of housing types for a total of 261 units

6024 Atoll Court: Accessory structure - An application to allow an accessory building (detached garage) on a property without a primary structure

8501 Auburn Boulevard: Big Lots/Rebounderz - An application has been received to convert an empty building (formerly K-Mart) into two businesses, an indoor trampoline facility and a retail store

8043 Holly Drive: A parcel map to allow the division of one parcel into three parcels

7882 Lichen Drive: Quick Quack Car Wash - An application has been received to construct a drive-thru car wash on a vacant parcel

7534 Old Auburn Road: Bearpaw Village - Review for the development of a 43-unit townhome project

7056 Sunrise Boulevard: Arco Gas Station and Car Wash - Review of a Use Permit and Design Review Permit to allow the construction and operation of a new gas station with convenience store and car wash

7512 Watson Way: Linmoore Fence Company - Seeking to expand existing business onto adjoining vacant parcels

Get involved and make a positive impact in your neighborhood!


Whether you are new to Citrus Heights and still unpacking your moving boxes, or if you've lived here since cityhood was just a gleam in the eye of a few, we encourage you to check out your local Neighborhood Area (NA) group to see how those involved make such a difference in their respective communities. You can too!

Citrus Heights is divided into 11 neighborhoods, each of which is represented by its respective group of residents (see map). There are ten different neighborhood groups (areas 7 and 8 are combined) that meet once a month. These popular meetings, commonly referred to as *NA Meetings*, allow residents to address neighborhood issues (e.g. traffic or crime), work on various projects, host City staff for informational presentations, and much more. Interestingly, the public recently voted creation of the numbered neighborhoods one of Citrus Heights' Top 10 Accomplishments since incorporation in January 1997.

The NA's are an excellent opportunity to get to know your neighbors, work together to preserve the quality of life enjoyed in your neighborhood, and stay current on what is going on in the City: trends, events, information, alerts. There is no cost to join an NA and you do not have to own a home in order to belong. Anyone who lives, rents, or owns property or a business in Citrus Heights can get involved.

All of the NA's are part of REACH (Residents' Empowerment Association of Citrus Heights). REACH is a coalition that consists of a board of directors comprised of a representative from each neighborhood. REACH represents the interests of the community and its citizens, encouraging participation to preserve the quality of life in our city. REACH meets the 1st Monday of each month at 6:30 p.m. in the Community Room at City Hall (6360 Fountain Square Drive).

The City's First-Time Homebuyer program provides low-interest loans of up to \$40,000 to low-income homebuyers that may be used for a down payment and closing costs.

Loan Highlights

- 30-year, silent second
- 3.00% interest
- No monthly payments
- Loan is based on income and need

Eligible Properties

- Single-family detached, condominium, or halfplex. Multi-unit structures and mobilehomes are *not* eligible
- Within the City of Citrus Heights
- Must be vacant at the close of escrow
- Maximum price does not exceed Sacramento County median (\$293,000 as of May 2016)
- Home inspection required

Republic Services

The Brown Cart - Residential Trash

Republic Services picked up over 20,000 tons of trash from Citrus Heights residents in 2016. Here's a reminder of what should be disposed of in your brown trash cart.

Goes in Trash Cart:

- Toys (batteries removed)
- Cotton, clothing, fabric
- Contaminated paper
- Hoses
- Light bulbs (incandescent only)
- Packing Peanuts (stuffed into bag)
- Plastic-coated milk cartons
- Waxed paper
- Ceramics
- Metal hangers
- Aseptic packaging (milk, soy, juice cartons)
- Any food that is not being composted/recycled



Keep These Items Out of Your Brown Cart:

- Electronics (TVs, computers)
- Fluorescent tubes, CFLs
- Hazardous materials
- Medical Waste, sharps
- Hot ashes and coals
- Household batteries (AA, AAA, C, D, 9V, button and lithium)
- Used motor oil and filters

Before throwing anything in the trash, look for alternative ways to reuse, donate or recycle the item.
