From the desk of the Chief

June 26, 2017, marked the CHPD's 11 birthday. As we do every year, CHPD held our annual Honors & Awards ceremony on June 29, to commemorate new employees sworn into office over the previous year, to acknowledge those who made significant professional achievements, and to honor acts of bravery and heroism during that past year. Mayor Jeff Slowey and all of City Council attended the event, along with Sacramento County Board of Supervisors Sue Frost, City Manager Christopher W. Boyd, and police dignitaries from throughout the region. In all, there were about 300 people who attended, and the ceremony was an elegant celebration to honor many special employees of CHPD as well as citizens from our community who performed fearless acts of bravery.

This year, CHPD proudly acknowledged three leadership promotions, a total of 10 new employees, and 17 new volunteers. Numerous employees were recognized for their time with the department including: seven volunteers who reached impressive milestones totaling over 26,000 service hours, three employees who have been with the department for five years, and 12 employees who have been with CHPD for 10 years. We recognized employees who have previously served in the military, continued their education through advanced education, as well as exceptional achievements in fitness. Specific honors to top performing officers in regards to the apprehension of suspected car thieves and other stolen property as well as drunk drivers. Awards were also presented to Distinguished Citizens for their partnerships with CHPD, bravery in dire situations, and their dedication to the betterment of the community.

Members of CHPD were given certificates, ribbons, plaques and medals to commemorate their exceptional volunteerism, going above and beyond, impressive accomplishments, and selfless dedication. To highlight just a few, five Life Saving Ribbons were presented to Community Services Officer Daniel Tsverov, Officer Chrystal Battaglia, Officer Todd Ross, Officer Nick Oldwin and Sergeant Janet Schaefer. Sergeant Chad Morris was selected by me personally to receive the Chief's Award, chosen for his exemplary dedication to the goals of the department and embodiment of its core values. Finally, Sergeant Ken Lewis, Detective Nathan Hutson and Officer Kenneth Spencer were presented with Distinguished Service Medals for distinguishing themselves by performing well in a stressful situation that involved the threat of imminent danger to themselves and others by using exceptional tactics and judgement.

As Chief of Police, I salute all of the honorees for their continued efforts to enhance public safety in the City of Citrus Heights!

Fourth of July Reminder: Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over



Citrus Heights, CA.—This Fourth of July, as friends and family travel to picnics and barbecues across the country, officers from the Citrus Heights Police Department, Sheriff Deputies and the California Highway Patrol, will be out stopping impaired drivers by targeting those who put lives in danger. As you prepare to drive home from the festivities, keep in mind that impairment by alcohol or drugs can be deadly Remember: Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over.

Officers from the Citrus Heights Police Department's DUI Enforcement Team will be deploying on the 4th of July holiday to stop and arrest alcohol and drug-impaired drivers. DUI Saturation Patrols will be deployed in areas with high frequencies of DUI collisions and/or arrests.

High Visibility Enforcement, using both DUI checkpoints and DUI Saturation Patrols, has proven to lower the number of persons killed and injured in alcohol or drug impaired crashes. Research shows that crashes involving an impaired driver can be reduced by up to 20 percent when well-publicized, proactive DUI operations are conducted routinely.

Officers will be looking for signs of alcohol and/or drug impairment. When possible, specially trained officers will be available to evaluate those suspected of drug-impaired driving, which now accounts for a growing number of impaired driving crashes.

NHTSA data shows that young drivers (18 to 34 years old) are especially at risk of driving drunk. In fact, 49 percent of the drivers 18 to 34 years old who were killed over the July Fourth period in 2015 were driving drunk (BAC of .08 or higher).

In recent years, California has seen an increase in drug-impaired driving crashes. The Citrus Heights Police Department supports the new effort from the Office of Traffic Safety that aims to educate all drivers that "DUI Doesn't Just Mean Booze." If you take prescription drugs, particularly those with a driving or operating machinery warning on the label, you might be impaired enough to get a DUI. Marijuana use can also be impairing, especially in combination with alcohol or other drugs, and can result in a DUI.

Plan your sober ride home before the party begins this July 4^{th} weekend celebration. Drivers are encouraged to download the Designated Driver VIP, or "DDVIP," free mobile app for Android or







- Placement in the Parade Line-Up is at the discretion of the CHCMB
- Objects must not be thrown or tossed into the crowd from any parade entry
