During the Fourth Quarter of 2017, crimes against persons reduced by one percent compared to the Third Quarter of 2017, and property crime decreased by five percent compared to the Third Quarter of 2017. Our measured approach to traffic education and enforcement resulted in a reduction of traffic collisions by seven percent, however, DUI related crashes increased by six collisions compared to the Third Quarter of 2017, likely a result of the holiday season. Traffic fatalities remained at zero.

The Citrus Heights Police Department reviews our programs, collateral and specialty assignments, and our goals every year. This allows us to ensure that our entire department is focused on the Core Values, Mission Statement and Vision we have set forth. It permits us to affirm our goals, set courses to accomplish new objectives, and remain ahead of the curve for planning the future of policing in our city.

Our strategic planning session and team building workshops help us best prepare ourselves with focused intent, established strategies, and thoughtful action in our continued effort to protect the citizens of Citrus Heights. 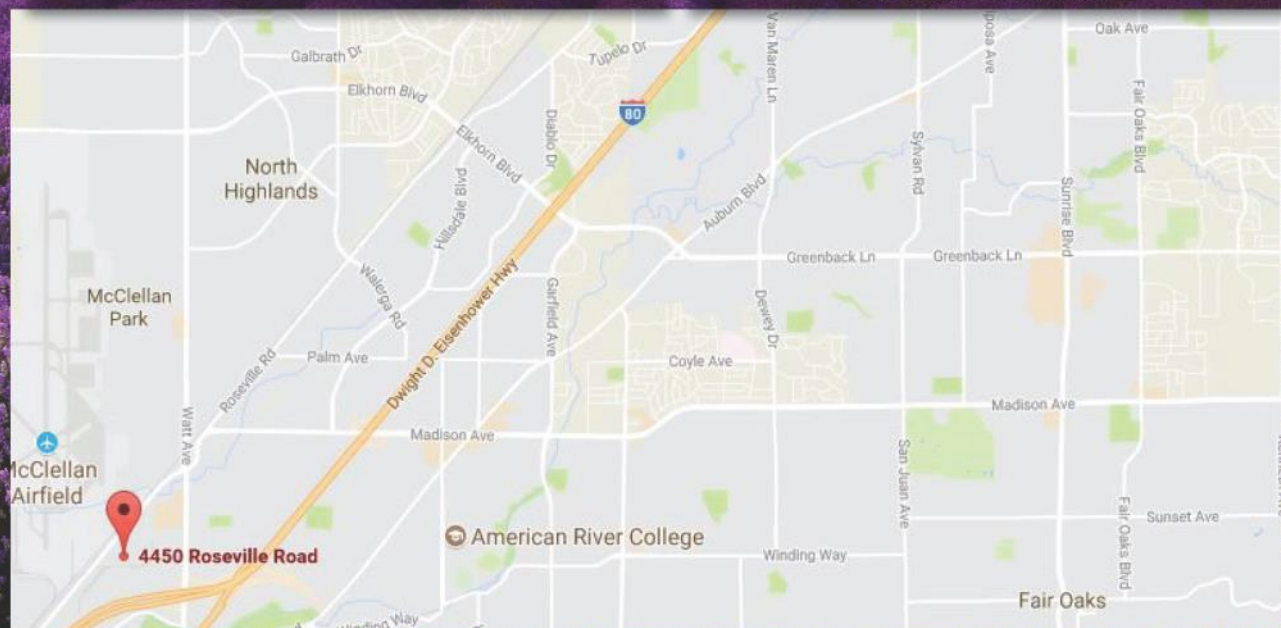

- ✓ Brake/transmission fluid and antifreeze
- ✓ Unused medications (non-controlled)
- ✓ Mercury thermometers and switches
- ✓ Pool chemicals and poisons
- ✓ Gasoline
- ✓ Car Batteries
- ✓ Small aerosol cans
- ✓ Paint and paint thinners
- ✓ Solvents
- ✓ Household cleaners
- ✓ Pesticides and herbicides
- ✓ Fluorescent tubes and bulbs
- ✓ Propane tanks (limit 2, maximum 7 gallons)

The Usual Suspects

Non-Recyclable Items That Are Frequently Misplaced In The Recycle Cart

Polystyrene (Styrofoam)

Because it is a type of plastic, Polystyrene is often placed in the recycling. Unfortunately, in Citrus Heights, this type of waste belongs in the trash. It should be avoided, as Polystyrene takes at least one million years to decompose. Some scientists aren't even sure if it does decompose. Polystyrene includes many cups, plates, to-go food boxes, and packing peanuts.



Individual Flimsy Plastics

Flimsy plastic, also known as film plastic,

is in fact recyclable, but it cannot be recycled individual, by itself. To recycle flimsy plastics, put all of them inside of one plastic bag until the bag is full and thick. Then, tie the bag at the top and toss it in the recycling bin.

Bunched together, flimsy plastics are more dense and less prone to blowing around, thus easier to recycle. Flimsy plastics include sandwich baggies, plastic grocery bags, and bubble wrap.



Compound Materials

Packaging made from multiple materials is not able to be recycled in today's market. Typically, in order to recycle something, it should be one material. Many food bags, granola bar wrappers, and juice packets are shiny and metallic on the inside, but they are made up of polymer materials. Until recycling markets change, they belong in the trash.

THE PLANNING DIVISION

The Planning Division coordinates the City's review of residential and commercial development projects. The Division evaluates the project for compliance with the City's General Plan, Zoning Code, and other City Standards.

Below is a selected list of projects currently under review :

:

7925 Arcadia Drive – Mitchell Farms. An application was received to develop a 39 acre parcel into a new development with a variety of housing types for a total of 261 units. The project is currently in the environmental review process.

6920 Auburn Boulevard – Stock Ranch Pad Building. An application is under review to allow the construction of a 10,000 sf multi-tenant pad building within the Stock Ranch Development.

7000 Auburn Boulevard – Costco Gas Station Expansion. An application is under review that would allow the addition of 3 pump dispensers (6 filling locations) to the existing gas station.

7078 Auburn Boulevard – Auburn Heights. An application was received requesting a tentative map, design review permit, and minor variance to construct an 8-unit attached single-family development on a small infill lot.

7766 Auburn Boulevard – California Quick Slice. An application is under review that would allow the conversion of a former gas station into a take-out/drive-thru pizza restaurant. The permit will include additional drive-thru window, exterior building renovations and landscaping.

THE PLANNING DIVISION

8501 Auburn Boulevard – Studio Movie Grill. An application has been submitted that would reformat an existing vacant space (former K-Mart store) into a movie theater with food and drink service.

7117 Oakberry Way – Well Reactivation. Cal-Am Water is proposing to reactivate a non-operational well. The reactivation will include the installation of new pump system and storage equipment.

6041/6199 Sunrise Boulevard – Applications were received to subdivide portions of the parking area of Sunrise Mall into individual parcels. One parcel is located where the existing US Bank is located and the other is the area of the Elephant Bar Restaurant.

7056 Sunrise Boulevard – Arco Gas Station and Car Wash. Review of a Use Permit and Design Review Permit to allow the construction and operation of a new gas station with convenience store and car wash.

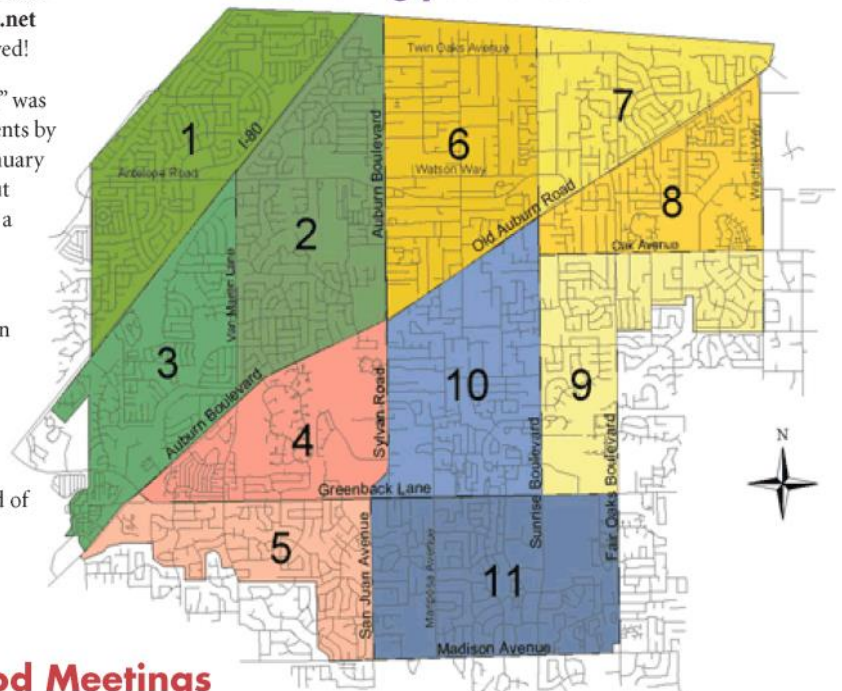
