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POLICE CHIEFS ELECT CITRUS HEIGHTS POLICE DE-PARTMENT CHIEF CHRISTOPHER W. BOYD PRESIDENT

Citrus Heights Police Chief Christopher W. Boyd was installed as president of the California Police Chiefs Association (CPCA) for a one-year term on February 26, 2014 at the organization's 37th Annual



Training Symposium. Chief Boyd will become the California Police Chiefs Association's 49th president; it has been 39 years since a chief from the Greater Sacramento area has served as the association president. Chief Boyd will play a significant role in the legislative process through his partnerships with the Governor's office and the state legislature.

Chief Christopher W. Boyd brings a wealth of professional experience to the position of president of Cal Chiefs having orchestrated the formation and implementation of the first ever City of Citrus Heights Police Department over seven years ago. Prior to his tenure as Chief of Police at the Citrus Heights Police Department, Chief Boyd served the Menlo Park Police Department for over 15 years in a variety of capacities to include Chief of Police. Chief Boyd was appointed to the Cal Chiefs' Board of Directors in 2010 and was elected third vice president in 2012.

"I am honored to lead the California Police Chiefs Association this next year. We continue to face issues related to the implementation of Realignment and the importance of sufficient funding for local law enforcement to mitigate Realignment's impacts on our communities. The association is also launching proactive medical marijuana regulation legislation to further ensure the public's safety, and reduce the harm that is currently unfolding in our state due to lack of regulation. We intend to focus on the issues of human trafficking, mental health, and youth intervention through collaboration with our partners. I look forward to working with my colleagues on these and many other issues that impact the safety of the citizens of California," said Chief Boyd.

Chief Boyd has always been committed to strong public safety through community policing. Under his leadership, the Citrus Heights Police Department received the prestigious James Q. Wilson Award for Excellence in Community Policing two years in a row for their innovative community policing programs. Additionally, he has held many leadership positions in the community as well as public safety organizations including chair of the Sacramento County Chiefs Association and as president of the Central Sierra Police Chiefs Association. Chief Boyd is a past board member for the Domestic Violence Intervention Center (DVIC) of Citrus Heights and was also the first Chairperson of the Central Valley Information Sharing System, Central Region Node (CVISS-CRN). Chief Boyd currently serves on the International Institute of Criminal Justice Leadership Advisory Board, and proudly serves on the board for the Citrus Heights Police Activities League (CHPAL).

Throughout his distinguished career, Chief Boyd has been active in fostering a safer community by forging strong relationships and working collaboratively with political leadership, the business community, educational leaders, and neighborhood stakeholders. He has invested countless hours in the development and management of community based domestic violence and youth intervention programs. Chief Boyd and his team have developed and implemented a cutting edge statistical crime fighting analysis tool called CATCH (Crime and Traffic in Citrus Heights). The CATCH model was designed to use statistical data to determine the best utilization of the department's resources in regard to fighting crime. A 13% decrease in the city's overall crime in 2013, the largest reduction in crime amongst cities in the Sacramento region, confirms the program's success.

Collectively, Chief Boyd's achievements and experiences make him the ideal successor to Chief Kim Raney, Covina Police Department, as the President of the California Police Chiefs Association during what will be a challenging year for public safety departments and local government. "I look forward to the challenges facing law enforcement this next year and will work collaboratively on the key legislative and public safety issues facing the profession," said Chief Boyd.

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Arcade Creek Preserve Ground Breaking - March 24th

Sunrise Recreation and Park District will be holding a <u>Ground Breaking Celebration</u> on Monday, March 24th beginning at 10:00 A.M. on site for the newest park in Citrus Heights and you are invited. Community/Economic Development Department

Auburn Blvd. Complete Streets Revitalization Project

Segment III of the Auburn Boulevard Project is making significant progress. Driveways, sidewalks, curb and gutter have been completed on the east-side from Sylvan

Trailer (7200 Auburn) to Citrus Heights Pet Hospital (7404 Auburn). Along with the street improvements, new street lights are also being erected and the landscape subcontractor is installing irrigation lines and preparing the soils for planting. By the end of the month the contractor is expected to start work on the next stages, demolishing and installing new sidewalks, driveways and curb and gutter from Carleton Lane to Pratt Ave (east-side) and the Sylvan Cemetery frontage (west-side). Construction of the project has been divided

into five stages in order to maintain pedestrian access at all times. Segment III is still on schedule to be completed in Summer 2014.

Segment II of the Auburn Boulevard Project, undergrounding of utilities and street improvements from Rusch Park to Sycamore Drive, is starting the closeout process and is expected to be presented to City Council for acceptance in March.

Even Friendly Dogs Bite

Be Smart When you are Around Dogs!

How to Tell When a Dog is Angry?

Dogs use body language to communicate just like people do. Angry dogs will:

- ♦ Stick their ears straight up
- ♦ Make the fur on their backs puff up
- ◆ Stick their tail straight up (may be wagging)
- ♦ Growl and show their teeth
- ♦ Stare at whomever they are approaching

Dog Bite Safety:

- ♦ Don't tease any dog or pull its tail or ears
- ♦ Never look a dog straight in the eye
- ◆ Don't disturb or sneak up on a dog while it is asleep or eating
- ♦ Never get near a mother dog when she is with her puppies.
- ♦ Don't pet stray dogs even if they seem friendly
- ♦ Always ask a dog's owner for permission to pet
- ♦ Neuter your male dogs; it reduces aggression
- ♦ Socialize your dog be sure your dog interacts with family, other people, and other animals
- ♦ Vaccinate your dog for rabies and other diseases
- ◆ Do not let your dogs roam be sure they are kept in properly fenced yards

Oops! I Called 911 on accident, now what do I do?!?

Some times as citizens we accidentally call 9-1-1. This happens on landline phones at businesses where you have to dial a "9" for an outside line, then a "1" for long-distance, and the person accidentally adds an extra "1". It also frequently happens on cell phones that have an "emergency" button that is a one touch speed dial for 9-1-1.



The fact that this happens is not something that concerns a typical communications center. We understand as call takers that mistakes happen. The problem occurs when citizens try to hang up quickly so the call doesn't "go through", or when they just say "Sorry!" and hang up. Our protocol for 9-1-1 hang ups is to try and determine where the caller was calling from, and if they had an emergency or if it was accidental. If you just stay on the line and answer the dispatcher's questions, we can clear out your accidental call in a matter of moments. If you hang up there are several time consuming steps that we are required to take in order to track the number you called from, and the closest location to where you were when you dialed the phone.

Cell phones come in two delegations right now. A "Phase 1" cell phone means that it isn't a "global positioning system" (GPS) equipped phone (or the GPS has been disabled), and we are just getting the address of the closest cell tower to the caller. This leaves us with a very wide search area in order to locate the caller. This is why we need you to give us your address first thing when you call. Your location is the most important piece of information that you could possibly give to a dispatcher; all other information is secondary. We must know where you are in order to help you.

The other kind of cell phone is a "Phase Two" cell phone which gives us GPS coordinates within fifty to three hundred meters of where you are calling from. Our protocol in relation to Phase Two hang ups includes sending an Officer to the location the call originated from. So if the call was just a mistake, not only is it wasting valuable resources in the communications center, but now we are sending one, and sometimes two, patrol units to the area to check for suspicious activity. This takes that Officer away from other calls for service.

The Dispatcher will answer the phone and ask you where the emergency is. Simply state that you accidentally dialed and then answer the follow up question the dispatcher has (usually just confirming your name, phone number, and location). Once this is done, the dispatcher can cancel the call for service. This takes less than 30 seconds and saves all the above time and resources. We understand that your impulse may be to hang up before we answer, but due to modern technology, we

will always get your call, and the best course of action is to stay on the phone line.







Citrus Heights Collaborative

The Citrus Heights Collaborative held its monthly meeting on Friday, February 14, 2014. The group heard speakers from:

- Adult Protective Services (APS) provided information on services and help available to adult victims of abuse, including financial abuse:
- Area 4 Agency on Aging provided information on county and regional programs and services available for seniors; and
- A County representative provided information on three County programs specifically for senior volunteers:
 - 1. Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP). RSVP is working in conjunction with Citrus Heights Read and is able to provide assistance and services, such as mileage or transportation reimbursement, to volunteers age 55+ who wish to volunteer in the schools.
 - 2. Senior Companion Program, which coordinates and provides assistance to volunteers 55+ who meet low income eligibility guidelines. Volunteers serve as senior companions, visiting clients, offering transportation, and providing socialization and companionship.
 - 3. Foster Grandparent Program, which provides assistance for volunteers 55+ who meet low income eligibility guidelines. Volunteers personalized tutoring and mentoring services to children with special needs.

Program eligibility rules and benefits differ slightly for each program, and may offer a stipend, mileage or transportation cost reimbursement, and/or insurance.

Continuum of Care Advisory Board

The Continuum of Care (COC) Advisory Board met on February 19, 2014.

Sacramento Steps Forward announced the hiring of Ryan Loofbourrow as New Executive Director. Ryan will be starting his position March 17, 2014.

As part of preparation for a workshop for the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors, Paul Lake,

Director of Sacramento County Department of Human Assistance requested input from COC members related to gaps in social services and services for the homeless. The workshop on the "Safety Net" is scheduled for April 9, 2014 at 2:00 p.m.

Members were advised that City of Sacramento has committed significant funding toward future projects related to ending homelessness as part of its mid-year budget review process.



Road Construction Projects



	•
Project	Status
Auburn Boulevard Segment 3	Working on the east side of the street from Sylvan Corners to Pratt. Completion of the project is June 2014.
Advanced Traffic Management System (ATMS)	Ongoing issue at Auburn & Kanai/Carleton with damaged detection due to the re-construction of the sidewalk and pavement. While the intersection is being rebuilt, the traffic signal will serve northbound and north to west left turn on a fixed cycle. This means that the light does not know when a car is going north or north to west, so the light turns green for a fixed amount of time.
Area 5 Traffic Safety, Accessibility and Walkability Phase 1B Project	The design consultant anticipates submitting the Final Plans and Specification package to the City in February and staff will advertise for construction bids in March. Construction should begin late spring 2014.
Sunrise/Sungarden Intersection Safety Improvement Project	Staff plans to submit a Request for Authorization (RFA) to construct to Caltrans in early March. Caltrans authorization to construct is anticipated by early April 2014, after which staff will advertise for bids within one month.
Bicycle Transportation Account (BTA) Grant (Northwest Neighborhood Connection (I-80 Overcrossing)	Project is funded. Staff will advertise project in fall 2014.
Areas 8, 9 & 10 Drainage Master Plan Study	This project is ready for presentation to Area 8, 9 and 10 residents for a final review. The input from residents at this meeting will be incorporated into the final document.
SRCC Creek Cleaning	Crews removed beaver dams near Misty Creek and Van Maren; they picked up four yards of litter, clean debris from 2000lf of Arcade Creek and cleaned up illegal dumps. A total of 40 cy of litter, debris, dumped garbage and trimmings were removed.
2014 Residential Street Resurfacing Program	Staff has begun evaluation of various streets city-wide for inclusion in the 2014 Residential Resurfacing project. Construction will begin on this project in July.
Storm Drain System Yearly Cleaning	Crews have been cleaning storm drains in Area 2 north of Auburn Blvd. and west of Auburn Blvd.
Wintergreen/Old Auburn Landscaping Infill Project	During the January 23 rd Study Session, the City Council provided the necessary direction and approval to move forward with the initial project but agreed to hold off on the actual landscaping installation because of the current drought status of the State of California. The paths, benches and shade trellises will be installed this spring, and then staff will wait for more favorable water conditions before deciding to move forward with the landscaping. The decision was proactive and sets a good example for the City and its residents to be water wise and consider conservation whenever possible. Project will go out to bid in March — more info to follow with future updates.
Twin Oaks and Mariposa Diversion Pipe (Area 6&7 Master Plan Imple- mentation)	Surveys and base mapping is complete. Environmental assessment is now underway.


Sylvan Community Center


