



From the desk of the Chief



We began the year continuing to navigate the challenges we faced coming out of a very difficult recession as well as the fallout from prison realignment. Then, unexpectedly, the events in Ferguson and New York unfolded. Later, Proposition 47 passed converting certain offenses from felonies to misdemeanors. Law enforcement is a fluid business; it moves quickly, changes hourly – we are familiar with the pace. Recognizing the need to redirect our efforts, the association stepped up in a big way, coming together to implement progressive leadership around these critical emerging issues.

CPCA realized a number of goals this past year including strengthening our voice in the capitol (where our most significant challenges lie), enhancing our legislative team, continued funding allocated by the governor to law enforcement, and proactively confronting and responding to the sometimes polarizing issues our profession faces. We worked hard to identify and respond to specific concerns as brought forward by our membership. We strategically managed bills and legislative matters to ensure the safest, best possible outcomes for law enforcement as well as the communities we serve.

I have long been an advocate of strong public safety through community policing, actively fostering safer communities by forging solid relationships and working collaboratively with political leadership, the business community, educational leaders, and neighborhood stakeholders. The platform Cal Chiefs afforded me greatly enhanced my relationships statewide, strengthened my ties in the capitol, created valuable partnerships where none previously existed, and allowed me the opportunity to establish a personal rapport with the Governor and his staff. These ancillary facets of my presidency will carry over, allowing me to better and more comprehensively serve the city of Citrus Heights.

I am very proud of our exceptional profession and the tireless efforts of police chiefs throughout California who continually endeavor to strengthen and enhance our industry. The progress Cal Chiefs made this past year set the course for moving forward in 2015; I can assure you we are on very solid ground. Our mission and work are of the highest calling and I remain fully committed to forwarding the cause and objectives of this noble organization and its distinguished members.

Sacramento County, CA— Metro Fire recently opened the application period for Fire Camp, a day camp that takes place from July 7-10, 2015. Fire Camp provides local children a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to experience today's fire service, first hand. The program is designed to instill self-confidence, teamwork, and basic understanding of the firefighting profession, in a fun and exciting atmosphere.




Campers are grouped in "strike teams" of eight campers, and each strike team is mentored by two Metro Firefighters. Campers learn valuable life safety skills, while discovering what it means to be a firefighter.

Ready to jump start your journey to becoming a recycling pro? Here is a list of recyclable items that should go in your blue cart:

- Paper Products brown bags, calendars, catalogs, junk mail, magazine, shredded paper (in a paper bag, stapled shut), greeting cards, etc.
- Small scrap metal scrap metal less than 10lbs.)
- Cans aerosol (must be empty), aluminum (tuna cans, beverage, pie plates, foil wrap, etc.), cookie sheets, tin and steel cans
- Cardboard moving boxes, empty pizza boxes (food free), US Mail/Fed Ex boxes, appliance boxes
- Chipboard Battery boxes/packaging, cake mix boxes, cereal boxes, cigarette boxes, paper egg cartons, notebook pads, shoe boxes, toy packaging, etc.
- Plastic anything with recycling symbol #s 1-7: bottles, food containers, jars, plastic bags (stuff all bags on one bag and tie shut), rigid plastics, baby wipes containers
- Glass products bottles and jars
- Aseptic Packaging milk, soy, and juice cartons, frozen food boxes

Baird Way Drainage Improvements	Installation of new drainage inlets and pipes to increase capacity and eliminate recurring nuisance ponding.	Construction expected to commence in Spring 2015.
Parkoaks Creek Bank Restoration Project - Brooktree Creek	Improvements to the creek bank at Parkoaks Drive and Brooktree Creek to prevent further creek bank erosion.	Construction expected to commence in Spring 2015
Sunrise Boulevard Bus Stop Improvements Project Phase 2	Installation of two bus stopping pads and new shelters on southbound Sun- rise Blvd; one at Macy Plaza Drive, one at Uplands Way.	Project has been completed
Sunrise Boulevard Complete Streets Project - Phase III	Pedestrian safety improvements along Sunrise from Antelope Road to Northern city Limits. Project will focus on the west side of Sunrise, and construct sidewalk, curb, and gutter; install access ramps and ADA upgrades and medians at the Twin Oaks intersection; modify the median on Sunrise north of Antelope; install street lights; resurface the entire roadway; and re-stripe traffic and bicycle lanes. 



Citrus Heights First-Time Homebuyer Program

Need Help Purchasing a Home? THE CITY CAN HELP!

The City's First-Time Homebuyer program provides low-interest loans of up to \$40,000 to low-income homebuyers that may be used for a down payment and closing costs.

Low-Interest Loans

The low-interest loan is structured as a second mortgage. The loan will have a rate of 3.00%, a term of 30 years with no required monthly payments. The total sum of the loan, with interest, will be due at the end of the 30-year term, upon sale or transfer of the property or if the borrower no longer occupies the home as their primary residence. The borrower must contribute a minimum of 1.00% of the purchase price. The actual amount of assistance is based on financial capacity.


